

## Ahead of Durban - Changing Geo-political Context (players)

- Already been scepticism from developed countries (US, EU)
  - US no progress on climate change leg in congress?
  - EU peripheral?
- Japan, Russia, Canada no second commitment period for the Kyoto Protocol





#### Changing Geo-political context (cont.)

- Voices from the developing world
  - LDCs and the Alliance of Small Island States (AOSIS) greater commitments immediately.
  - ALBA group (Bolivia, Cuba, Dominica, Ecuador, Nicaragua and Venezuela) capitalism is the root cause.
  - Africa Group, G77+China.

BASIC (Brazil, South Africa, India and China)



- BASIC Points of agreement:
- 1. 2<sup>nd</sup> commitment period of the Kyoto Protocol (common but differentiated responsibilities and respective capabilities).
- 2. Emphasis on adaptation (for LDCs)
- 3. Finance and technology transfer



#### Global governance and the CC regime

Representation and Effectiveness of current system of Global Governance?

- Use of BASIC as a platform issue focused, political grouping.
- Success in using developing country grouping AU (Barcelona – 2 track process), BASIC (Copenhagen Accord)

But

Sustainability – representation and effectiveness?





#### COP 17: Expectations as hosts

- Moderate expectations
- Ensure inclusive and transparent negotiations (multilateralism)
- The African agenda and championing African interests
- Defend the two track process
- Second commitment period of the Kyoto Protocol
- South Africa as a bridge builder



# Opportunities for India/SA Green Diplomacy

Foreign Policy Priorities –

- Pragmatic considerations
- Embrace multilateralism especially on issues of gg (IBSA, BRICS, BASIC, G20, NAM, G77+China)

Closer cooperation in the fields of energy (renewable) and food security.

Diverse societies, socio-economic development issues.

Soft power (democracy, struggle for human rights, Climate Expo).

2<sup>nd</sup> track diplomacy/citizens diplomacy – pressure groups.
