- » Established in 2000
- » More than 133,000 patients 87 percent of those who need treatment are receiving ARV treatment
- » AIDS mortality and AIDS-related deaths (in adults) halved since treatment program began
- At approximately 90 percent, adherence to treatment is among the highest in the world
- Reduced new infections in children by 80 percent



## Cancer vaccination in KZN schools

ABOUT 120 schoolgirls in northern KwaZulu-Natal were vaccinated for cervical cancer yesterday as part of a demonstration project.

The project, which was researched by the departments of health and education as well as pharmaceutical company MSD South Africa, was done with the aim of demonstrating the feasibility of vaccinating older children in schools using existing resources.

The girls, whose ages range from nine to 12 years, were from Prince Layukona Full Service School and Ceza Primary School, and seemed eager to participate.

Professor Indres Moodley, the director of the health outcomes research unit at the School of Family and Public Health Medicine at the University of KwaZulu-Natal, said a Department of Health vaccina-

# Lessons Learned: Partnerships

 The complexity of the issues beyond the ability of any single organization or country alone

 People most directly affected should determine their own needs and priorities; key to building capacity and ensuring sustainability

 Important to figure out how to get things done within the country; Integration, where feasible, is most effective

Investment in human resource capacity is critical

# Lessons Learned: Partnerships

- Investment in building relationships with key partners and stakeholders is necessary
- Good partnerships take time, require trust and need careful management
- There is a continuing need for coordination, communication and commitment from all stakeholders
- Public-private partnerships can catalyze the implementation of strategic interventions
