2018 ACTIVITIES IN BRIEF

During another active year we have achieved a total of 13 Speaker's meetings – consistent for the past 3 years! – besides our youth events: the annual Interschools Quiz and Careers Evening at UCT. Again, we have tried to focus on important trends and events internationally as well as on our own continent and their relevance for South Africa. We started off in January with an assessment of Zimbabwe post-Mugabe, who had been ousted from power 2 months previously after a 37-year rule, by our regular commentator Prof Brian Raftopoulos. We then took advantage of the visit of former Israeli Ambassador to South Africa during the Mandela era, Dr Alon Liel who gave an update on SA / Israel relations from his perspective. We addressed the on-going drama of Brexit when former British Minister in the John Major government, Robert Jackson gave us a positive take on it. We also took another look at the Trump administration in the US when Roger Cohen, the renowned New York Times columnist, on a flying visit to Cape Town, gave us his take on what Trump's America means for South Africa and the world to our second biggest audience of the year. The biggest belonged to the address given by Dominique de Villepin, former French Foreign Minister at the Centre for the Book, which represented a very successful collaboration with the French Embassy and Consulate General and we thank them for their support.

Ambassadors we hosted included the Australian High Commissioner, the Chinese Ambassador jointly with the Cape Chamber and the Russian Ambassador. Other highlights included talks with an African theme by representatives of the Scalabrini Centre dealing with managing migration in sub-saharan Africa; African liberalism by DA MP and spokesperson on International relations, Stevens Mokglapa and the resurgence of traditional authorities in sub- Saharan Africa by Bradlow fellow Dr Jan Erk.

The Interschools Quiz – always a highlight of our year - was held once again in August at Bishops with 45 schools participating and a successful Careers Evening was held at UCT in October. Full reports about these events as well as a full table of events appear below.

BRANCH EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE AND OPERATIONS

Our core group of Exco members have worked hard this year to ensure that our programme was carried out. Unfortunately, a number of stalwarts of the Executive Committee have had to move on after years of sterling service to the Branch. Our vice chair, Martyn Trainor has kept membership up to date and he and his "company of volunteers" handle all the preparations and arrangements before and after our events. We owe this dedicated group which includes veteran member Chris Inskip, Richard Morris, Lee Hall, Peggy de Kock, Wendy Paisley, Stephen Craven, Lee Hamilton Liz Wheeler, John Patten and Anthony Silberberg, John & Joy Hauser, Gail & Mark Ogram and Luke White who all work together with Pippa Segall, a big debt of gratitude. Prof. Chris Saunders ably assisted by Luke White who deals with student liaison at UCT looked after the Universities portfolio and Luke did a great job chairing the Careers evening. Rob Mackay performs a great supporting role and takes on any task allocated to him with aplomb. Richard Morris who joined Exco this year has a firm grip on our finances and accounts for which we are very grateful.

Dr Martha Bridgeman in cooperation with Pippa Segall and her team did a great job as usual with the 26th interschools quiz. Solly Moeng of Brand SA was keynote speaker and the charming Africa Melane of Cape Talk Radio again MC'd the quiz.

Pippa Segall, our branch and project coordinator again had a busy year and assisted the branch by keeping the books up to date. Her hard work on the successful Careers evening is greatly appreciated.

Our particular thanks to the Konrad Adenauer Foundation and their tireless Cape Town head Christina Teichmann who partner with SAIIA WC on many of our events. We are very grateful for their support and also for their generous sponsorship for the Careers evening. We hope to develop this partnership where and when it is suitable for both parties.

We continue to be grateful to the Mountain Club of South Africa, Cape Town section for the continued use of their club at reasonable rates and the kind assistance of their members at our events.

MEMBERSHIP

The membership numbers of the Branch [see table below] remain healthy and there has been an increase in the key **revenue producing categories** [Diplomatic; Institutional; Educational, School; Family/Member plus 1; Individual; and Student].

There was a small increase in the subscription rates for the 2018/19 at or below the general inflation rate. Visitors fees were increased to R 50 per person [students unchanged at R 20] to ensure that visitors also contribute to the overheads of the Branch.

FINANCIAL REPORT

The annual financial report for the year ended 30 June 2018 is attached and has been prepared on the cash basis of accounting as was done in previous years. These financial statements show the receipts and payments for the year and financial position of the branch at the year end.

The accumulated operating fund stands at R10,286 (2017 R14,823) and the quiz fund at R193,269 (2017 R146,884). These funds are represented by cash and bank balances of R203,555 (2017 R161,707).

In order to make the financial outcome of the activities more meaningful the receipts and payments relating to the speaker's meetings, the careers evening and the branch administration are grouped separately to highlight the net surplus or shortfall for each category.

These net results of a surplus or (shortfall) may be summarised as follows:

It is pleasing that the shortfall on the speaker's meetings has been substantially reduced relative to that for the prior year.

The careers evening that was funded by the Konrad-Adenauer Foundation is close to a breakeven as planned.

The breakeven outcome on administration is down on the surplus of the prior year mainly due to a R2,156 reduction in membership subscriptions received and a R6,272 increase in administration fees.

The movements on the annual Inter-School Quiz fund are set out in the financial report. Please note that at 30 June 2018 the full funding has been received but the bulk of the expenditure is still to be incurred and paid as the quiz is held in August.

UNIVERSITIES

SAIIA Western Cape organised a successful Careers Evening at the New Lecture Theatre at the University of Cape Town (UCT) on 2 October. This event was co-sponsored by the Konrad Adenauer Stiftung. Around 140 students interested in international relations attended from UCT, the University of the Western Cape (UWC), CPUT and Stellenbosch University. With fewer exhibitors in the foyer of the lecture theatre than on previous occasions, there was more room for students to congregate there. As the UCT technicians were late arriving, some students had drifted away before the speeches began in the large lecture theatre, but a hundred or so listened to them. Luke White was an excellent master of ceremonies. Speakers included Solly Moeng from Don Valley, John Stupart from African Defence Review and Daily Maverick; Mkhuleko Hlengwa, an MP from the IFP; Diana Nyabonga from S-RM; and Lennon Monyae, African Peer Review Mechanism (APRM). It is hoped that the Konrad Adenauer Stiftung will partner with us again next year when another Careers Evening is held, perhaps at UWC or Stellenbosch. SAIIA INTERSCHOOL QUIZ

The 26th Annual SAIIA Western Cape Interschool Quiz on International Affairs was held on Thursday, 16 August, at Bishops (Diocesan School for Boys), and featured Mr Solly Moeng of Brand SA fame as keynote speaker and Africa Melane of Cape Talk Radio as Quiz MC. The winning team was from the Oracle Academy of Ottery, with Reddam High Atlantic Seaboard taking second place and St Cyprian's

taking third. The Cape Academy for Maths, Science and Technology garnered the Cape Times trophy for 'Most Improved'.

On behalf of the Quiz Committee, we again thank the Abe Bailey Trust, our major funder for the 2018 quiz, as well as the many other donors who made the quiz possible. A heartfelt thanks goes again to Bishops for the provision of venues and technical support, for both the quiz and pre-quiz workshop that took place on 21 June and included 15 schools seeking additional preparation.

CONCLUSION

2018 has been a year of some big events which I referred to earlier. In a year when South Africa hosted and chaired the BRICS Summit in Johannesburg, we achieved half of our goal of having the Ambassadors of the BRICS countries address the Branch – the Chinese Ambassador in July and the Russian Ambassador in September. We still have Brazil and India in our sights – perhaps for next year.

Together with our partners and sponsors and our team of volunteers we look forward to meeting the challenges of 2019 with some more interesting talks and events in fulfilment of our mandate spelt out as I said earlier by SAIIA's chief executive Elizabeth Sidiropoulos.
