

Mr. Luc Eyraud is currently chief of the division in charge of the regional studies in the African Department of the International Monetary Fund. He supervises the work on the *Regional Economic Outlook for Sub-Saharan Africa*, published twice a year. Mr. Eyraud is also mission chief for Botswana and leads the annual Article IV consultation with country authorities.

Prior to this, Mr. Eyraud was mission chief for WAEMU countries (leading the regional consultation) and mission chief for Benin (with an IMF program) and, earlier, team leader of the Fiscal Monitor in the Fiscal Affairs Department.

Since he joined the IMF in 2007, he has worked on a number of program and surveillance countries in all regions of the world, including Argentina, Chile, Cyprus, Georgia, Hungary, India, Italy, Japan, Madagascar, Mauritania, Paraguay, the Philippines, Portugal, Romania, South Africa, Spain, and Togo.

Most of his research focuses on fiscal policy, including fiscal institutions and fiscal frameworks. He has published extensively on fiscal rules and fiscal decentralization. More recently, he has been coordinating several projects on the financing of African economies and budgetary anchors.

Before joining the IMF, Mr. Eyraud worked as a civil servant at the French Treasury. He is a graduate of the Ecole Normale Supérieure and the University Paris Sorbonne. He also holds a degree in econometrics from ENSAE.
